### Course Topics

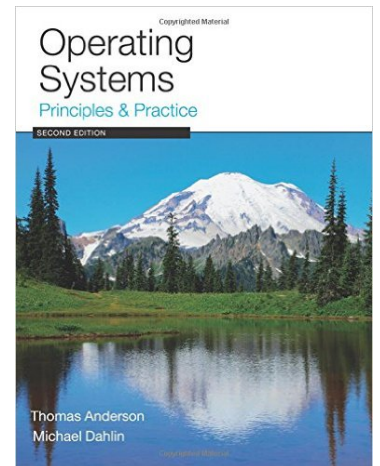
- Process abstraction, concurrency, threads, memory management, protection, file system
